- How does the author suggest that the beatitudes impact the Christian vocation?
- In what ways is the vocation to compassion a social vocation as well as a personal vocation?
- What is the role of community in the process of vocational discernment?
- How might I be challenged to more fully embrace the vocation to be poor in spirit?
- How might I more consciously apply the principles of Catholic social teaching to my family, work life, neighborhood, parish community, and so on?
